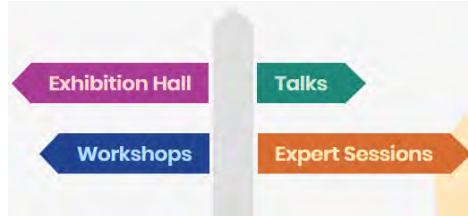

Your railway ancestors and the *Railway Work, Life and Death* project

If you have railway worker ancestors, you might not realise there's a good chance they had an accident on the job. If so, they might have left records that help you find out more about them, their work, and their accident. In my talk, I'll help you understand more about what railway work in Britain and Ireland involved from the later nineteenth century to the middle of the twentieth century, what accident records exist and how they might aid your family history research, and how you might use the *Railway Work, Life & Death* project's free resources.



Workhouse records

This workshop will introduce you to samples of records that are found both locally and nationally within England and Wales. It will provide you with guidance on how these records may be found. Workhouse records are eclectic, they are not always lists of names and dates but unfortunately not all survive. However, when you find something about your family you are often presented with the type of information you would not have been able to find in any other way. I will introduce you to the types of workhouse records that have been used at Gressenhall Farm and Workhouse Museum to produce inmate biographies and to those additional records which are about to be used to write biographies of workhouse staff.



Migration throughout the UK

Debbie's talk not only explores her ancestors' movements around the UK but also demonstrates the difficulties she encountered whilst tracking them down.

Family historians often struggle to understand why, or how, their forebears moved within the UK and this presentation will signpost ideas to follow up.

Many hints and tips are included in this presentation which will both inspire and assist all those who are struggling to track their elusive ancestors around the country.

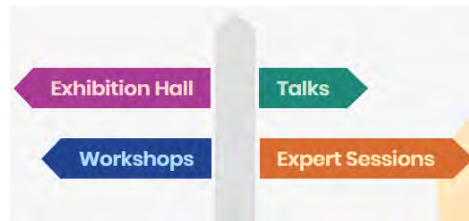
